<u>Key Verse</u>: "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of mercies

and God of all comfort." (2 Corinthians 1:3)

Greetings (1:1-2)

- I. God Had Purpose in Paul's Suffering (1:3-11)
 - A. Suffering evokes comfort (3-7)
 - 1. God gives great comfort in suffering (3-4)
 - 2. Abundant comfort accompanies abundant suffering (5)
 - 3. Suffering and comfort benefit others (6-7)
 - B. Suffering strengthens trust (8-11)
 - 1. Paul suffered severely in Asia (8)
 - 2. Paul's suffering strengthened trust in God (9-10)
 - 3. Paul was supported by their prayer and thanks (11)
- II. Paul Had Purpose in Changing His Promise (1:12-24)
 - A. Paul had pride in the Corinthians (12-14)
 - B. Paul's promise to them was changed (15-16)
 - C. Yet Paul's promises are reliable (17-20)
 - 1. His promise was not made lightly (17)
 - 2. His promise was made in good faith (18-20)
 - D. But Paul changed promise for good purpose (21-24)
 - 1. He called God as witness (21-22)
 - 2. He desired to spare them sorrow (23-24)

Lesson 2: Restoration and Victory through Christ (2 Corinthians 2)

<u>Key Verse</u>: "Now thanks be to God who always leads us in triumph in Christ, and makes

manifest the aroma of His knowledge by us in every place."

(2 Corinthians 2:14 NKJV)

I. Paul Explained Why He Changed His Plans (2:1-2)

- A. He did not want to come in sorrow (1)
- B. He did not want to cause them sorrow (2)

II. Paul Exhorted Them to Restore the One Disciplined (2:3-11)

- A. Paul had commanded his discipline (3-5)
 - 1. He had written out of grief and love (3-4)
 - 2. The offender caused grief to all (5)
- B. The punishment was sufficient for him (6)
- C. They should now forgive and restore him (7-11)
 - 1. They should forgive and comfort him (7)
 - 2. They should confirm their love (8-10)
 - 3. Paul has already forgiven him (11)

III. Paul Exulted in Victory through Christ (2:12-17)

- A. He exulted in victory in Corinth (12-14)
 - 1. He had an open door at Troas (12)
 - 2. But he had to leave it because of unrest (13)
 - 3. He thanks God for victory (14)
- B. He exulted in victory in his ministry (15-17)
 - 1. Christians are the fragrance of Christ to God (15)
 - 2. Christians are an aroma to the saved and lost (15-16)
 - 3. His ministry is with sincere integrity (17)

<u>Lesson 3</u>: <u>The Christians' Glorious Ministry</u> (2 Corinthians 3)

Key Verse: "But we all, with unveiled face, beholding as in a mirror the glory of the Lord,

are being transformed into the same image from glory to glory, just as by the

Spirit of the Lord." (2 Corinthians 3:18, NKJV)

I. Christians Are Christ's Letter (3:1-3)

- A. Paul did not need a letter of commendation (1)
- B. Because the Corinthians were his letter (2)
- C. Since they were a letter of Christ (3)
 - 1. Ministered by Paul
 - 2. Written by the Spirit
 - 3. Written on their hearts

II. Christians Minister a More Glorious Covenant (3:4-18)

- A. Christians minister the New Covenant of the Spirit 4-6)
- B. The ministry of the Spirit is more glorious (7-11)
 - 1. It is more glorious than Moses' ministry of death (7-8)
 - 2. It is more glorious than Moses' ministry of condemnation (9-10)
 - 3. It is more glorious than Moses' temporary ministry (11)
- C. The ministry of the Spirit is more bold (12-17)
 - 1. It is not veiled like Moses' face (12-13)
 - 2. It is not veiled like the Old Testament (14-15)
 - 3. Because the Lord removes the veil (16)
 - 4. And the Spirit grants liberty (17)
- D. The ministry of the Spirit is transforming (18)
 - 1. We have unveiled faces
 - 2. We behold the Lord's glory
 - 3. We are transformed to His image
 - 4. The transformation is in succeeding degrees of glory

<u>Lesson 4</u>: <u>How to Effectively Serve God</u> (2 Corinthians 4)

<u>Key Verse</u>: "Therefore we do not lose heart. But though our outward man is perishing, yet

the inward man is being renewed day by day." (2 Corinthians 4:16 NKJV)

I. Serve with Boldness to Magnify God's Glory (4:1-6)

- A. Boldly reject discouragement (1)
- B. Boldly renounce wrong methods (2)
- C. Boldly resist veiling the Gospel (3-4)
- D. Boldly radiate the Gospel light (5-6)

II. Serve with Humility to Magnify God's Power (4:7-12)

- A. Humility is an earthen vessel (7)
- B. Humility endures pressure and perplexity (8)
- C. Humility endures persecution and defeat (9)
- D. Humility bears the marks of death (10-12)

III. Serve with Expectation to magnify God's Promises (4:13-18)

- A. Expectation has faith in God's promises (13-15)
 - 1. Faith causes speaking out (13)
 - 2. Faith expects the resurrection (14-15)
- B. Expectation is optimistic (16-18)
 - 1. Does not become discouraged (16)
 - 2. Sees the ultimate inward renewal (16)
 - 3. Sees the ultimate eternal glory (17)
 - 4. Sees the ultimate reality (18)

Lesson 5: Incentives for Serving Christ (2 Corinthians 5)

Key Verse: "Therefore we are ambassadors for Christ, as though God were pleading by us:

we implore you in Christ's behalf, be reconciled to God."

(2 Corinthians 5:20 NKJV)

I. We Have Confidence of a Future Heavenly Body (5:1-8)

- A. God has prepared us a heavenly body (1)
- B. We greatly desire this heavenly body (2-4)
- C. We now have the Holy Spirit as a deposit (5)
- D. We are confidence of this heavenly body (6-8)

II. We Have Caution because of Future Accountability (5:9-11)

- A. We are cautious to be well pleasing (9)
- B. Because we must appear at Christ's judgment seat (10)
 - 1. All Christians must give an account
 - 2. All Christians will be judged for what is done in this body
 - 3. All Christians will be judged according to works
- C. We are cautious to persuade men (11)

III. We Have a Commission as Christ's Ambassador (5:12-21)

- A. The Ambassador does not commend himself (12-13)
- B. The Ambassador is constrained by Christ's love (14-15)
- C. The Ambassador contemplates the new creation (16-17)
- D. The Ambassador has a ministry of reconciliation (18-20)
- E. Because God made reconciliation possible through Christ (21)

<u>Lesson 6</u>: Characteristics of a True Minister of Christ (2 Corinthians 6)

Key Verse: "We give no offense in anything, that our ministry not be blamed."

(2 Corinthians 6:3 NKJV)

- I. The True Minister of Christ Pleads Grace (6:1-2)
 - A. There is an accepted time for God's grace
 - B. There is a day of salvation
 - C. That time and day is now
- II. The True Minister of Christ Practices Grace (6:3-10)
 - A. He gives no offense (3)
 - B. He commends himself as God's minister (4-10)
 - 1. He commends himself by patience (4-5)
 - 2. He commends himself by godliness (6-7)
 - 3. He commends himself by humility (8-10)
- III. The True Minister of Christ Prompts Separation (6:11-18)
 - A. They should not be unequally yoked with unbelievers (11-16)
 - 1. There is no fellowship (14)
 - 2. There is no communion (14)
 - 3. There is no accord (15)
 - 4. There is no portion (15)
 - 5. There is no agreement (16)
 - B. They should separate from unbelievers (17-18)
 - 1. They should separate because of uncleanness (17)
 - 2. They should separate because God is Father (18)

Lesson 7: Paul Was Encouraged by the Corinthians (2 Corinthians 7)

Key Verse: "Nevertheless God, who comforts the downcast, comforted us by the coming of Titus." (2 Corinthians 7:6 NKJV)

- Paul Encouraged Them to Spiritual Cleanness (7:1) I.
 - A. Be clean because of God's promises
 - B. Be clean from filthiness of flesh and spirit
 - C. Be clean by perfecting holiness
- II. Paul Was Encouraged by Their Response to Correction (7:2-12)
 - A. He was encouraged by fullness of comfort (2-4)
 - B. He was encouraged by the coming of Titus (5-7)
 - He was discouraged before the coming of Titus (5)
 - God comforted him by Titus' coming (6)
 - God comforted him by Titus' consolation (7)
 - C. He was encouraged by their response to his letter (8-12)
 - 1. Paul's letter made them sorry (8)
 - Their sorrow led them to repentance (9) 2.
 - Their sorrow produced good results (10-12)
- III. Paul Was Encouraged by Titus' Reactions (7:13-16)
 - A. He was encouraged because of Titus' joy (13)
 - B. He was encouraged because his boasting was true (14)
 - C. He was encouraged because Titus' love was strengthened (15-16)

<u>Lesson 8</u>: <u>The Grace of Sacrificial Giving</u> (2 Corinthians 8)

<u>Key Verse</u>: "But as you abound in everything -- in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in all

diligence, and in your love for us -- see that you abound in this grace also."

(2 Corinthians 8:7 NKJV)

I. The Example of the Macedonian Churches' Grace of Giving (8:1-7)

- A. The Macedonians were given grace to give (1)
- B. The Macedonians gave liberally beyond their ability (2-4)
 - 1. They gave liberally from deep poverty (2)
 - 2. They gave freely beyond their ability (3)
 - 3. They gave with urgency (4)
- C. The Macedonians first gave themselves (5)
- D. The Corinthians are urged to give in like manner (6-7)

II. The Example of Christ's Grace of Giving (8:8-15)

- A. Christ had the grace of giving (8-9)
- B. Christ gave His all for your enrichment (9)
- C. The Corinthians are urged to complete their intentions (10-11)
- D. God accepts the willing heart (12)
- E. Giving provides equity (13-15)

III. The Encouragement in the Grace of Giving (8:16-24)

- A. Titus was sent to encourage the Corinthians (16-17)
- B. Another brother was sent with Titus (18-21)
- C. A third brother was sent also (22)
- D. The Corinthians are urged to cooperate with them (23-24)

<u>Lesson 9</u>: <u>Principles and Practical Results of Giving (2 Corinthians 9)</u>

<u>Key Verse</u>: "Thanks be to God for His unspeakable gift." (2 Corinthians 9:15 NKJV)

- I. Paul Prompted the Corinthians to Give (9:1-5)
 - A. He knew their willingness to give (2)
 - B. Yet he prompts them, to avoid embarrassment (3-4)
 - C. He prompts them, to avoid covetousness (5)
- II. Paul's Principles of Christian Giving (9:6-9)
 - A. The principle of sowing: bountiful (6)
 - B. The principle of choice: cheerful (7)
 - C. The principle of grace: sufficiency (8-9)
 - D. The principle of growth: good works (8-9)
- III. Paul's Prayer for the Corinthian's Giving (9:10-11)
 - A. May God supply the source (10)
 - B. May God multiply the gift (10)
 - C. May God increase the fruit (10)
 - D. May God enrich liberality (11)
- IV. Practical Results of Christian Giving (9:12-15)
 - A. Giving supplies needs of saints (12)
 - B. Giving brings thanks to God (12)
 - C. Giving proves obedience (13)
 - D. Giving produces prayers (14-15)

<u>Lesson 10</u>: <u>Paul Answered His Critics</u> (2 Corinthians 10)

<u>Key Verse</u>: "For though we walk in the flesh, we do not war according to the flesh."

(2 Corinthians 10:3 NKJV)

I. Paul's Ministry Was Not According to the Flesh (10:1-6)

- A. His ministry was lowly like Christ (1)
- B. His ministry was bold against accusers (2)
- C. His ministry was spiritual not carnal (3-6)
 - 1. He did not walk according to the flesh (3)
 - 2. He did not war according to the flesh (3)
 - 3. His warfare was spiritual (4-6)
 - a. Powerful through God
 - b. Pulls down strongholds
 - c. Puts down arguments
 - d. Puts every thought into obedience
 - e. Punishes all disobedience

II. Paul's Ministry Was Not According to Weakness (10:7-11)

- A. Paul's ministry was of Christ (7)
- B. Paul's ministry had authority (8-11)
 - 1. It was given by the Lord (8)
 - 2. It was given for edification (8)
 - 3. It was given with power (9-11)

III. Paul's Ministry Was Not Self-Seeking (10:12-18)

- A. He did not compare himself with others (12)
- B. His boasting was limited to his own sphere (13-14)
 - 1. His sphere was set by God (13)
 - 2. His sphere reached to Corinth (14)
- C. His boasting did not exceed his sphere (15-16)
- D. His boasting was in the Lord (17-18)

Lesson 11: Paul Defended His Apostleship (2 Corinthians 11)

Key Verse: "For I consider that I am not a bit behind the most eminent apostles."

(2 Corinthians 11:5 NKJV)

- I. Paul Had the Concern of an Apostle (11:1-4)
 - A. He was jealous for their spiritual chastity (1-2)
 - B. He was fearful of their being deceived (3)
 - C. He was fearful of their being corrupted (3-4)
- II. Paul Had the Authority of an Apostle (11:5-15)
 - A. He was equal to the best apostles (5)
 - B. His authority had been fully manifested (6)
 - C. His authority is not diminished by his lack of pay (7-11)
 - D. He refused pay to quiet his accusers (12)
 - E. His accusers are false apostles (13-15)
- III. Paul Had the Credentials of an Apostle (11:16-33)
 - A. He was reluctant to boast of his authority (16-21)
 - B. He had the best of credentials (22-27)
 - 1. He was of spotless Jewish ancestry (22)
 - 2. He had abundant ministry for Christ (23-27)
 - a. He had abundant suffering (23-25)
 - b. He had abundant danger (26)
 - c. He had abundant labor (27)
 - C. He had the heart of an apostle (28-29)
 - D. He had divine protection (30-33)

<u>Lesson 12</u>: The Marks of Paul's Apostleship (2 Corinthians 12)

<u>Key Verse</u>: "Truly the signs of an apostle were accomplished among you with all

perseverance, in signs and wonders and mighty deeds."

(2 Corinthians 12:12 NKJV)

I. Paul Had Visions and Revelations (12:1-10)

- A. He was caught up to Paradise (1-4)
 - 1. It occurred 14 years earlier (1-2)
 - 2. He does not know whether bodily or not (2-3)
 - 3. He was caught up to the third heaven (2)
 - 4. He was caught up to Paradise (4)
- B. He heard inexpressible words (4)
- C. He boasts of that one (5-6)
- D. He was given a thorn in the flesh (7-10)
 - 1. It was a messenger of Satan (7)
 - 2. It was to buffet him (7)
 - 3. It was given lest he be overly exalted (7)
 - 4. He prayed for its removal (8)
 - 5. God gave him sufficient grace (9)
 - 6. God's power is revealed through weakness (10)

II. Paul Had the Signs of an Apostle (12:11-13)

- A. He was not behind the most eminent apostles (11)
- B. He accomplished the signs of an apostle (12)
- C. The church was not inferior to others (13)

III. He Cared for the Church Like an Apostle (12:14-21)

- A. He is coming to them the third time (14)
- B. Yet He will not be a burden (14-15)
- C. He did not take advantage of them formerly (17-18)
- D. He does this for their edification (19)
- E. Yet he fears meeting them (20-21)
 - 1. Lest there is disappointment (20)
 - 2. Lest there is trouble (20)
 - 3. Lest God humbles him to see their sin (21)

<u>Lesson 13</u>: Paul Promised to Demonstrate His Authority (2 Corinthians 13)

Key Verse: "But I trust that you will know that we are not disqualified."

(2 Corinthians 13:6 NKJV)

I. Paul Promised to Come with Authority (13:1-4)

- A. He promised to come the third time (1)
- B. He promised not to spare them (2)
- C. He promised because they sought proof (3-4)
 - 1. Christ, who is in him, is not weak
 - 2. Paul will live in power toward them

II. Paul Prompted Their Self Examination (13:5-6)

- A. He prompted them to examine themselves (5a)
- B. He prompted them to prove themselves (5b)
- C. He prompted them to be sure Christ was in them (5c)
- D. He prompted them to know his authority (6)

III. Paul prayed That They Would Do Right (13:7-10)

- A. He prayed that they would do what was honorable (7-9)
 - 1. Though Paul seemed disqualified (7b)
 - 2. Yet Paul did nothing contrary to the truth (8a)
 - 3. Paul rejoiced in his weakness and their strength (9a)
- B. He prayed that they might be complete (9b)
- C. He wrote to them about these things (10)
 - 1. To avoid sharpness
 - 2. According to his authority
 - 3. For their edification

IV. Paul Presented His Final Exhortations and Greetings (13:11-14)

- A. He presented his final exhortations (11)
 - 1. Be complete
 - 2. Be of good comfort
 - 3. Live in peace
 - 4. The God of love and peace will be with you
- B. He presented his final greetings (12-14)
 - 1. Greet one another (12)
 - 2. The saints greet you (13)
 - 3. Closing benediction (14)
