Hosea's Marriage Symbolizes Israel's Unfaithfulness (Hosea 1-2)

Key Verse: "And I will betroth thee unto me for ever; yea, I will betroth thee unto me in righteousness, and in judgment, and in loving-kindness, and in mercies." (Hosea 2:19)

I. Hosea Marries Unfaithful Gomer (Hosea 1)

- A. God commands Hosea to marry Gomer (1:1-2)
 - 1. Hosea was to marry an unfaithful woman
 - 2. Hosea's wife was to symbolize Israel
- B. God gave Hosea's children symbolic names (1:3-9)
 - 1. His son Jezreel: Sown or Scattered by God (3-5)
 - 2. His daughter Lo-Ruhama: No Mercy (6-7)
 - 3. His son Lo-Ammi: Not My People (8-9)
- C. God gave Israel a promise of restoration (1:10-11)
 - 1. Israel will be innumerable (10)
 - 2. Israel will be restored to sonship (10)
 - 3. Israel will be united under one head (11)

II. Hosea's Marriage Is Applied to Israel (Hosea 2)

- A. God pleaded for Israel to be faithful (2:1-5)
 - 1. He pleads for her to set aside unfaithfulness (1-2)
 - 2. He warns of the awful alternative (3-5)
- B. God's plan for Israel is "Judgment Now" (2:6-13)
 - 1. He will isolate them from idols (6-7)
 - 2. He will withhold crops (8-9)
 - 3. He will expose their shame (10-11)
 - 4. He will destroy supposed rewards (12-13)
- C. God's promise for Israel is "Restoration" (2:14-23)
 - 1. He will restore their fruitfulness (14-15)
 - 2. He will restore their marriage (16-18)
 - 3. He will restore their faithfulness (19-23)

Hosea's Reconciliation Symbolizes Israel's Restoration (Hosea 3)

Key Verse: "Afterward shall the children of Israel return, and seek the LORD their God, and David their king; and shall fear the LORD and his goodness in the latter days." (Hosea 3:5)

Introduction: Hosea's family life was to be symbolically and prophetically like God's relation with the nation of Israel.

I. God Commands Hosea to Be Reconciled With Gomer (Hosea 3:1-3)

- A. God commanded him to love her (3:1)
 - 1. Love her though unfaithful
 - 2. Love her with the LORD's love
- B. Hosea purchased her back as a slave (3:2)
 - 1. He purchased her from slavery
 - 2. He purchased her with all his worth
- C. Hosea restored her as his wife (3:3)
 - 1. He isolated her for cleansing
 - 2. He isolated her from unfaithfulness
 - 3. He isolated her for himself

II. God Likens Gomer's Restoration to Israel (Hosea 3:4-5)

- A. She was like Israel in isolation (3:4)
 - 1. Israel will be isolated from her King
 - 2. Israel will be isolated from her Temple
 - 3. Israel will be isolated from her idolatry
- B. She was like Israel in restoration (3:5)
 - 1. Israel will be restored in latter days
 - 2. Israel will be restored to the LORD
 - 3. Israel will be restored to her King
 - 4. Israel will be restored to her worship
 - 5. Israel will be restored to God's blessing

Conclusion: Although Israel has been unfaithful to God, they will be eventually returned to their land and be restored to a right relationship with the Lord.

The LORD Indicts Israel's Unfaithfulness (Hosea 4-5)

Key Verse: "Ephraim is joined to idols: let him alone." (Hosea 4:17)

Introduction: After Hosea recovered his adulterous wife from the slave market and restored her as his wife once more, the Lord began a series of prophecies of Israel's rejection and restoration.

I. The LORD Indicts Israel For Rejecting Him (Hosea 4)

- A. Israel willfully rejected God's Law (4:1-5)
 - 1. They rejected the ethical aspects of God's Law (1)
 - 2. They rejected the moral aspects of God's Law (2)
 - 3. Their rejection will be judged (3-5)
- B. Israel will be rejected by God (4:6-11)
 - 1. They will be rejected for forgetting God's Law (6)
 - 2. They will be rejected for increased sin (7)
 - 3. They will be punished for their rejection (9-11)
- C. Israel will not be restrained by God (4:12-19)
 - 1. He will not restrain their idolatry (12-13)
 - 2. He will not restrain their immorality (14)
 - 3. He will leave them alone to their sin (15-19)

II. The LORD Will Withdraw From Israel For Rejecting Him (Hosea 5)

- A. The LORD will withdraw from unfaithful Israel (5:1-6)
 - 1. Israel is a snare (1-2)
 - 2. Israel is unfaithful (3-5)
 - 3. So the LORD will withdraw His face (6)
- B. The LORD will ruin unfaithful Israel (5:7-12)
 - 1. He will ruin their land (8-10)
 - 2. He will ruin their people (11-12)
- C. The LORD will withdraw His Presence (5:13-15)
 - 1. Israel sought foreign help (13)
 - 2. So the LORD will depart (14)
 - 3. Until they repent and seek God's face (15)

The LORD Indicts Israel's Wickedness (Hosea 6-7)

Key Verse: "Come, and let us return unto the LORD: for he hath torn, and he will heal us; he hath smitten, and he will bind us up." (Hosea 6:1)

I. The LORD Indicts Israel's Wickedness in Worship (Hosea 6)

- A. The godly remnant pleads for Israel's revival (6:1-3)
 - 1. They plead for repentance (1)
 - 2. They hope for restoration (2)
 - 3. They hope for return of the LORD (3)
- B. God reminds Israel of their wicked worship (6:4-11)
 - 1. They do not respond to God's Word (4-5)
 - 2. They do not understand God's desires for worship (6)
 - a. He desires worship not ritual
 - b. He desires mercy not sacrifice
 - c. He desires knowledge not offerings
 - 3. They are unfaithful to God's covenant (7)
 - 4. They practice wickedness (8-11)

II. The LORD Indicts Israel's Wicked Ways (Hosea 7)

- A. Israel is ignorant of God's concern (7:1-3)
- B. Israel's wicked ways are illustrated by four similes (7:4-16)
 - 1. Israel is like a heated oven: aflame for evil (4-8)
 - 2. Israel is like a half-baked cake: immature (9-10)
 - 3. Israel is like a silly dove: gullible (11-12)
 - 4. Israel is like a deceitful bow: unreliable (13-16)

The LORD Will Punish Israel's Unfaithfulness (Hosea 8-10)

Key Verse: "My God will cast them away, because they did not hearken unto him: and they shall be wanderers among the nations." (Hosea 9:17)

Introduction: After the LORD indicted Israel for their wicked worship and wicked ways, He declared the reasons and the results of their coming punishment.

I. Five Reasons For Israel's Punishment (Hosea 8)

- A. Israel transgressed God's covenant and law (8:1-3)
- B. Israel set up their own king (8:4a)
- C. Israel made themselves idols (8:4b-6)
- D. Israel trusted in foreign alliances (8:7-10)
- E. Israel made many altars (8:11-14)

II. Five Results of Israel's Punishment (Hosea 9)

- A. Israel's vineyards will fail (9:1-2)
- B. Israel's people will be captive (9:3-6)
- C. Israel's prophets will be foolish 9:7-9)
- D. Israel's people will be fruitless (9:10-16)
- E. Israel's people will be castaways (9:17)

III. Further Results of Israel's Punishment (Hosea 10)

- A. Israel's king will be removed (10:1-4, 7, 15)
- B. Israel's idols will be carried to Assyria (10:5-7)
- C. Israel's high places will be destroyed (10:8)
- D. Israel's delightful work will become labor (10:9-11)
- E. Israel is called to repentance (10:12)
- F. Israel's punishment is due to wickedness (10:13-15)

Conclusion: When God's people sin, punishment can be expected; but there is hope in repentance. It is better to repent than to experience chastisement.

The LORD Promised Mercy and Restoration (Hosea 11-12)

Key Verse: "Therefore turn thou to thy God: keep mercy and judgment and wait on thy God continually." (Hosea 12:6)

Introduction: After foretelling the results of Israel' punishment, the LORD promised Israel future mercy, love, and restoration.

I. The LORD Promised Israel Mercy and Love (Hosea 11)

- A. The LORD gave them love at first (11:1-4)
 - 1. The LORD called them from Egypt in love (1-2)
 - 2. The LORD taught them in love (3)
 - 3. The LORD restrained them in love (4)
- B. The LORD will give them mercy in judgment (11:5-7)
- C. The LORD will give them love in restoration (11:8-12)
 - 1. The LORD will not execute fierce anger (8-9)
 - 2. The LORD will restore them to their land (10-12)

II. The LORD Promised Israel Restoration (Hosea 12)

- A. The LORD had a controversy with Israel (12:1-2)
- B. The LORD was trusted by Jacob (12:3-5)
 - 1. He supplanted his brother (3)
 - 2. He had power with God (3)
 - 3. He spoke with God at Bethel (4-5)
- C. The LORD called Israel to repentance (12:6)
- D. The LORD condemned Israel's apostasy (12:7-8)
- E. The LORD promised Israel restoration by prophets (12:9-14)

Conclusion: Although Israel will suffer the chastening of the LORD, upon repentance they will again enjoy His mercy, love, and restoration.

The LORD Promised Future Blessing For Israel (Hosea 13-14)

Key Verse: "I will ransom them from the power of the grave; I will redeem them from death: O death, I will be thy plagues; O grave, I will be thy destruction: repentance shall be hid from mine eyes." (Hosea 13:14)

Introduction: Having previously promised Israel mercy and restoration, the Lord again promised kingdom blessing and pleaded for them to repent.

I. Though Israel Is Dead, There Will Be Blessing in the Kingdom (Hosea (13)

- A. Israel is dead because of Baal (13:1-8)
 - 1. Israel died because of Baal (1-2)
 - 2. Israel's death is illustrated (3)
 - a. Like a morning cloud
 - b. Like the early dew
 - c. Like the chaff
 - d. Like smoke
 - 3. Yet the LORD is Israel's only God (4)
 - 4. Though God blessed them, He will punish them (5-8)
 - a. He blessed them in the past (5-6)
 - b. He will punish them (7-8)
- B. Israel will be blessed in the kingdom (13:9-16)
 - 1. The LORD will be their help (9)
 - 2. The LORD will be their King (10-13)
 - 3. The LORD will ransom them from death (14-16)

II. The LORD Pleaded For Repentance and Promises Blessing (Hosea 14)

- A. The LORD pleaded for Israel's Repentance (14:1-3)
 - 1. Israel should return to the LORD (1)
 - 2. Israel should request forgiveness (2)
 - 3. Israel should request mercy (3)
- B. The LORD promised blessing in the future (14:4-8)
 - 1. The LORD will heal (4)
 - 2. The LORD will love (4)
 - 3. The LORD will nourish (5)
 - 4. Israel will grow (5-6)
 - 5. Israel will prosper (7)
 - 6. Israel will acknowledge the LORD (8)
- C. The LORD promised blessing to the wise (14:9)

Conclusion: Although Israel has a history of rebellion and idolatry, they will repent and enter into kingdom blessings. Likewise, backsliding Christians have hope of restoration and blessing through repentance.
